

Survey on Niwot Ridge, Paleocultural Research Group September 2014

Archaeology of Niwot Ridge and Surrounding High Altitude Landscapes of the Front Range

In the summer of 2014, Paleocultural Research Group organized an archaeological survey of the UNESCO Niwot Ridge Biosphere Reserve. The property is located on the University of Colorado's Mountain Research Station study area. The first survey session was completed by the CSU archaeological field school under the direction of Jason LaBelle and the second session included PCRG staff and volunteers led by Mark Mitchell. Jim Benedict first recorded sites on Niwot Ridge in the late 1960s but no formal survey of the area had been completed to date. The survey area is located in the heart of the extensive high altitude game drive systems and camp sites recorded by Benedict and others. Our goals were to document the archaeology on the property, to update evaluations on previously recorded sites and to explore how the archaeology on Niwot Ridge compares to the surrounding region. Results of the survey will be presented and then compared to other areas in the Indian Peaks to show differences in past use of high altitude landscapes. Preliminary analysis suggests Niwot Ridge was used differently than surrounding areas and some possible explanations for this will be presented.

Bio:

Chris Johnston is a Project Archaeologist and Lab Manager for Paleocultural Research Group in Broomfield and a Project Archaeologist for the Center for Mountain and Plains Archaeology at Colorado State University. Chris received his BA in Anthropology from CU Boulder in 2010 and is currently finishing his MA thesis at CSU on the Roberts Ranch buffalo jump in northern Larimer County. Chris is originally from Steamboat Springs and has had a life-long interest in the Native peoples who lived in the mountains and Plains and has carried that to his research. Chris has spent time working in CRM archaeology and for the Forest Service, but his passion is working in research archaeology and particularly with volunteers in the lab and the field.



Edie DeWeese Receiving the Carol Bancroft History Project Award

History Colorado Honors Edie DeWeese with Bancroft History Prize Awarded for Alonzo Allen Archaeological Project

The Miles and Bancroft Awards Committee is pleased to announce that Edie DeWeese is the 2014 recipient of History Colorado's prestigious Caroline Bancroft History Award. The award was made in recognition of DeWeese's project, the Alonzo N. Allen Archaeological Survey, a two-year research and excavation program begun in 2012 and made possible by Bob Brunswig, Kris Holien, and volunteers from the Indian Peaks Chapter of the Colorado Archaeological Society.

The award is named for Colorado historian, Caroline Bancroft, author of original works on Colorado history, on which the opera The Ballad of Baby Doe and the musical The Unsinkable Molly Brown were based. At her death, Bancroft provided for a monetary award to be given annually by History Colorado (formerly the Colorado Historical Society) to a Colorado individual, organization, or museum that has made a major contribution to the advancement of Colorado history. The award, for communities under 50,000 population, most often goes to museums and historical societies, so it is especially significant that DeWeese was selected from all the candidates across the state.

In recommending DeWeese for the Caroline Bancroft award, the awards committee noted, "The competition was stiff but the committee felt that this project was thorough in its methodology and reporting. It is a great example of one person's vision and labor resulting in a valuable project for a community."

The Alonzo N. Allen Cabin Site Archaeological Survey was a volunteer-based archaeological study consisting of historical archival background research and a two-year field investigation to gather information and document remains of the 1864 Allen cabin, the first structure built in Allenspark (on land now owned by the Hilltop Guild). With no budget or official backing, DeWeese conceived of and led the project that resulted in the preservation of hundreds of artifacts and the site's registration on the State of Colorado's historic inventory. The volunteer labor, largely from Indian Peaks volunteers, was valued at nearly \$20,000.

The award was presented to DeWeese at History Colorado's annual meeting and reception, November 20, at the museum in Denver.

What will you work on?

The Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation (OAHP) has archaeological collections that have yet to be completely processed for permanent curation. PAAC volunteers may receive credit toward certification at either the Laboratory Trainee or Laboratory Technician level by helping the State Training Coordinator in the cataloging and analysis of these materials.

Why sign up?

PAAC Lab training is a great way to learn about and practice analyzing and cataloging artifacts. This is great training for anyone interested in archaeology. In addition, volunteers may receive credit toward certification at either the PAAC Laboratory Trainee or Laboratory Technician level.

What are the prerequisites?

In General, no prior experience is required. However, lab space and equipment for volunteers is limited, so if too many PAAC participants wish to volunteer on a scheduled lab day, preference will be given to those volunteers who have already earned the Lab Trainee certificate and are working toward the Lab Technician certificate, and others who have completed one or more of the following courses:

- a. Introduction to Archaeology, CAS & PAAC
- b. Introduction to Laboratory Techniques
- c. Prehistoric Lithics Description and Analysis




