DENVER CHAPTER MEMORIAL DAY

FIELD TRIP

Plans are well underway for the Denver Chapter/CAS charter bus trip into the Southwest on a guided "site--sight seeing trip". Members of CAS from other chapters are invited.

Although the schedule is not finalized at this time, our plan is for an early departure from Denver on Saturday, May 28th. We will make passenger pickups in Denver, Castle Rock, Colorado Springs, and Pueblo--with a lunch stop in Alamosa or Monte Vista. Depending on our arrival time in the Farmington, New Mexico area, we may get to tour either Aztec or Salmon Ruins that afternoon. We will spend the 29th at Chaco Canyon and one or two of the outliers, ending up at Gallup, New Mexico for the second night. Day three will see us on the Zuni Reservation for a guided tour by Colorado State Archaeologist, Emerson Pearson. Emerson was a Reservation Archaeologist several years ago. We can expect to see unexcavated and non-restored sites in this area. This raw archaeology will contrast dramatically with that at Chaco, where considerable restoration has taken place. The end of day three brings us back to Colorado to the Cortez area, where we hope to visit Crow Canyon under leadership of Steward Streiver of Koster Site fame. The fourth day finishes up the trip with more Crow Canyon and our return back home.

NOTE: THIS IS A FOUR DAY TRIP ON A THREE DAY WEEKEND so working people wishing to attend will need to get Tuesday off.

Arrival in Denver is expected to be about nine or ten o'clock.

I will be trying to get good rates for motels enroute and food will be restaurant fare. Thus far, only the transportation costs have been figured. This will be \$67.50 per person. We will operate on a first come, first served, basis; and your payment of the transportation cost will reserve your place. Send a check for \$67.50 to:

COLORADO ARCHAEOLOGICAL AWARENESS YEAR CONTEST

The purpose of Colorado Archaeological Awareness Year is to increase the awareness of Colorado citizens to the richness and importance of the archaeological resources of this state, and through this awareness, to decrease the loss of this wonderful heritage that occurs through uninformed activities and senseless acts of vandalism.

As part of the Colorado Archaeological Awareness Year activities, the Colorado Archaeological Society is sponsoring a writing contest for papers on Colorado archaeology. There are four categories: High School, College or University undergraduate, Graduate, and Amateur. The non-fiction topic may be anything having to do with Colorado archaeology. High school students are limited to 1600 words, while other entries can be no longer than 6,000 words. (There are about 300 words on a typed double spaced page.)

The winning papers in all four categories will be published in Southwestern Lore.

Entries should be typed, double spaced on non-erasable paper. Figures should be easy to read with black ink on white paper. Photographs should be black/white with good contrast. Xeroxes of illustrations are not acceptable. References should be used if printed material is cited. For other questions about style or format, refer to a recent issue of Southwestern Lore.

A cover letter should clearly indicate in which category the author wishes to compete. Entries must be post-marked no later than June 30, 1983. The Judges' decision will be made by August 31, 1983 and all contestants will be notified by the middle of September.
