A talk on the Laramie River Project, an archaeological survey in Northern Colorado, by Mr. Keith Abernathy, this month's guest speaker, will open the meeting. Mr Abernathy, the field director of the Laramie River Project, is a past Vice-President of Denver- C.A.S. He has helped draft cultural resource management plans for the Department of the Interior for the Arapahoe Motorized Recreation Area; and Mr. Abernathy co-authored the report on the Crescent Shelter I site along with Mr. David Ford. Kieth also gives instruction in flint-knapping.

REPORT FROM THE STATE ANNUAL MEETING:


