

#### REGULAR MEETING, NOV. 27

"From Pots to Potters" is the title of Dr. Hannah Huse's talk and slides. This is a case study in archaeological interpretation using the Earl H. Morris Kawaika-a collection of Hopi Ceramics. Dr. Huse feels that the research potential of these collections is usually under-valued, even by archaeologists and that the one thing the Kawaika-a collection represents is the potential for asking new questions of old collections. Currently, Dr. Huse supervises and teaches in the museology program at the University of Colorado Museum.




# AND PIECES FROM YOUR EDITOR

Then be sure to go to the Denver Museum of Natural History, Denver, for the new IMAX show "Genesis". It is the story of Earth and the continual changes that mold the face of our planet. If you are lucky and happen to be in Phoenix, Arizona, this winter (and who wouldn't like to be?) absolutely don't miss the Heard Museum's newly opened exposition of the "Native Peoples of the Southwest", the largest permanent exhibition of its kind in the U. S. The "Native Peoples" collection, a chronicle of 150 centuries of the history and culture of the American Southwest opened last Monday. The exhibits are lifesize examples from 15,000 years of history in the area now occupied by Arizona and its neighboring states. In a separate room, the remarkable collection of several hundred kachina dolls are housed. There is also am impressive and vast collection of basketry as well as an extensive exhibit of pottery. The museum is open year around except on holidays from 10 AM to 4:45 PM. Even if you can't get away this winter, maybe you can make it on your summer vacation.

The meeting was called to order by President, Bill Boyle, at 8 PM at his home, 950 Pasque, Longmont. Four Board members were present and constituted a quorum. Discussion was held concerning the arrangements made for the next speaker, Dr. Omer Stewart. The Henderson Museum has asked permission to tape the Peyote Ceremony presented by Dr. Stewart as the original tape was erased and the Museum wants another for the archives.

The Board agreed to reimburse Kay Evatz for the honorarium paid to Mark Chenault. Also Kay, recently returned from the Primitive Harvest workshop at Crow Canyon, said that she had been approached by Dr. Bruce Bradley regarding a Primitive Pottery class to be held in Boulder in early spring. He would need at least 10 students @ \$100 each for a 4-5 day,8 hour per day session. Bruce would bring pinon and juniper for the firing. Kay has received an offer of room and board for him if there is enough interest. Subject tabled until next board meeting.

Bill announced that Rabbit Mountain survey scheduled for Sept. 30th had been cancelled due to the snow storm on Friday. Those who had signed up were called.

Kay said she had a list of prospective speakers who had volunteered their expertise. She will turn over the list to the new Vice President.

The Board decided that a sign-up sheet should be available at the next several meetings for those interested in taking the Archaeological Survey class from O. D. Hand. We need to decide on a schedule, what month and would people be willing to go to Denver on Saturdays.

The Board moved and seconded to purchase the APPDAR book for \$17 for the Chapter library. They also agreed to subscribe to membership in the Center for the Study of Early Man which includes a subscription to the Mammoth Trumpet. Bill said we should encourage people to use our library and that we should have a list available for people to request what they wish to read from Cleo Barnes at the meetings.

Discussion was held about social times after meetings. Bill said that it was not possible at the U. M. C., but he would check on the cost of having coffee and cookies catered by U.M.C. Everyone agreed that it would be a good idea to have some sort of social gathering after meetings as this is the only time some of our members see each other.

Sign-up sheets for car pooling for the American Anthropological Assn. Meetings November 14-17 are to be made available at the Oct. meeting.

Suggestion was made to appoint a Co-Field Director (possibly a professional anthropologist or archaeologist). Andi Barnes and Mike Burney (if he joins the Chapter) were suggested.

Bill said he had considered suggesting the Chapter be host to a CAS Quarterly Meeting at the C. U. campus. Those present thought it was a good idea. He will attend the Jan. meeting and suggest it.

Discussion regarding buying film and/or slides of Chapter activities for our archives, and possible purchase of duplicates from members.

Prior to the business meeting, Kay Evatz, Vice President, introduced Dr. Omer Stewart to a capacity crowd of members and guests. Dr. Stewart related that his first experience with the Peyote religion was in 1937 and his most recent one was in Grand Junction where he testified at a trial. He gave a most interesting talk in which he showed a chart of the positions of the participants in the circle and explained the procedures of the ceremony and the articles used the drum, the flute, staff, cloth, crucifix and the fan. He said that regardless where the religion is situated - California, Oklahoma, Wisconsin, etc., it remains intact. The people add the religions together, but don't mix them up. After his talk there was an extended question and answer period. The Henderson Museum and the Anthropology Club cooperated in taping the entire talk for the archives.

Bill Boyle, President, opened the business meeting by announcing the availability of the Chaco Protection Act information and urged the membership to write to William Clark, Secretary of the Interior to include Chimney Rock in this protection act. He also requested the membership to write the Regional Forrester (name and address in the October Calumet).

Bill said that Video tapes were made of the Annual Meeting in Canon City. If anyone is interested we can get the tapes for a meeting. He said that the most enjoyable part of the meeting was meeting people from other Chapters.

Boyle apologized for those showing up for the Rabbit Mountain survey which had been cancelled. If a like sutuation occurs again, call any of the officers for information.

Kay announced that there were sign-up sheets for the PAAC Archaeological Site survey course.

The drawing was held for the Dallas John print and it was won by Peter Christensen, CAS Representative.

Sue Lacey, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the slate of officers with a short biography of each and asked them to stand up so that the membership could see who they were. Bill opened the floor for nominations. There were no new nominations.

Mary Sucke reported on the tee shirts. We can get them in blue or black heather with appropriate color edging on the collar and cuff. The cost to the Chapter will be \$4.25 and we will sell them for a couple dollars more as a fund raising effort. There will be a sign-up sheet and meetings for people to order the size and color they want. There will be samples at the meeting so that new people can see them.

Leni Clubb, Secretary, announced that an Absentee Ballot will appear in the November Calumet and we will vote by ballot at the Nov. meeting.
