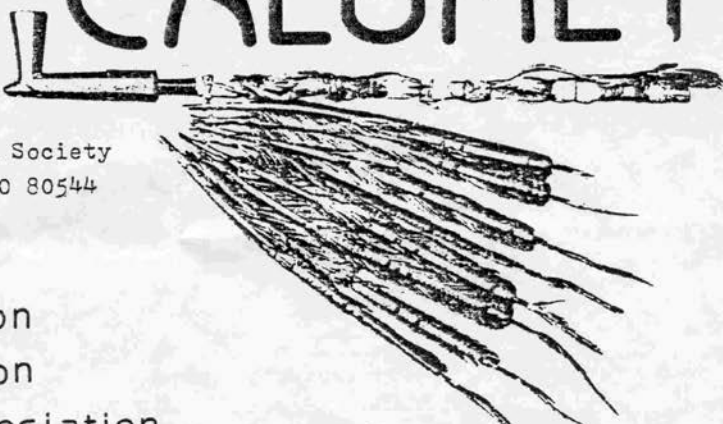

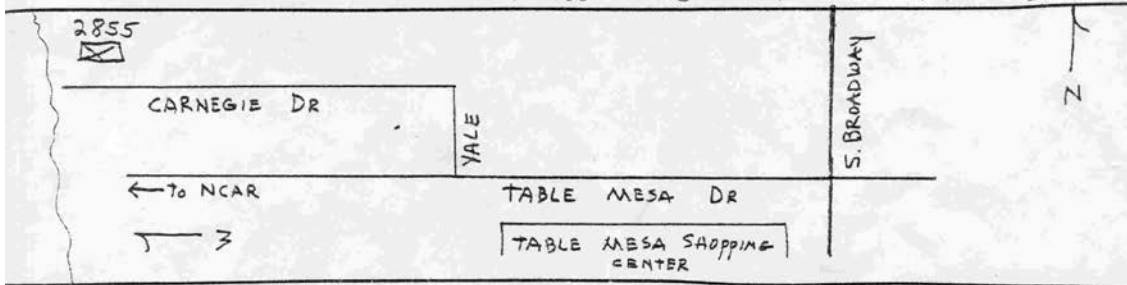

Dear PAAC Participants:

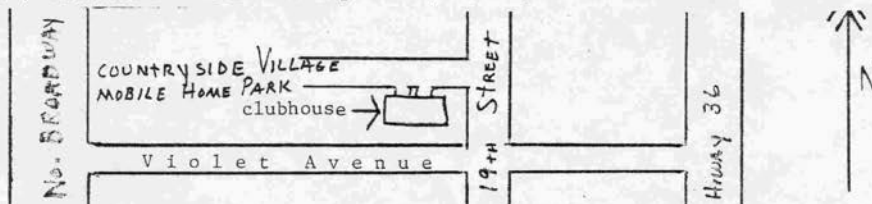

PAAC (PROGRAM FOR AVOCATIONAL ARCHAEOLOGICAL CERTIFICATION)

Many of us hear about the PAAC classes from friends, the newspapers, and/or descriptions of the classes in our Chapter newsletter. For some of us this is our first introduction to the Colorado Archaeological Society which we have to join in order to participate. We learn how to survey, map and fill out state-required forms; how to identify lithics and ceramics; learn about Colorado Pre-history, etc., but how many of us really understand what PAAC is all about beyond earning certification as Provisional and Certified Surveyor?

The Program for Avocational Archaeological Certification was established in 1978 as a joint effort of the Colorado Archaeological Society (CAS) and the Office of State Archaeologist (OSAC). It is designed to be a mutually beneficial educational program for avocational and professional archaeologists. It is a function of the Statewide Archaeology Preservation Program which is a program of the Office of the State Archaeologist (OSAC) and the State Historic Preservation Officer.

Certification categories are: Provisional Surveyor, Certified Surveyor I, Certified Surveyor II, Specialty Surveyor. A total of ten seminars are offered to complete the certification; Archaeological Laboratory Techniques which include Certified Laboratory Trainee and Certified Laboratory Technician. In the future, the program will offer certificates for various degrees of competence in excavation and as the need arises, certificates in other areas of archaeological interest may also be offered. Holders of certificates in given areas of expertise will be formally recognized as competent to perform certain activities as specified by the certificate. (excerpted from the new manual for PAAC)

COOPERATIVE EFFORT BETWEEN LYONS CHAPTER, CAS, AND C. U. BOULDER

Some of you may already know that the University of Colorado Museum has a rich history of archaeological research in Colorado. Prior to the formation of the state file, the University Museum was a clearing house with its own site file system for sites identified by faculty, staff and students. The earliest site reports in the file date back to the 1940s and of course are quite cursory and inadequate by today's standards (believe me, some of these reports are artifacts). In other words, they desperately need updating on state forms.

This problem of the Museum's may be a blessing for our Lyons Chapter, CAS because it presents us with some opportunities for fieldwork. With the approval of appropriate landowners, interested Chapter members will be able to record these sites for submittal to the Colorado Preservation Office, and consequently to: 1) work on our site recording techniques, 2) get our names on some forms for PAAC certification, and 3) help the Museum properly document its existing collections from these sites. It is hoped that this cooperative effort between the Colorado Archaeological Society (Lyons Chapter) and the University of Colorado Museum will set a wonderful precedent for continued working relationships in the future.

Many of these sites are along the front range in Boulder County and of course we will have to wait for adequate ground visibility to proceed with field work. Meanwhile, as one of your Field Directors for 1985, I will compile a list of sites requiring our attention. I will look forward to receiving and responding to any questions and ideas which anyone might have regarding this project.

REPORT ON THE QUARTERLY MEETING IN COLORADO SPRINGS BY SHARON PAY,
CAS REPRESENTATIVE.

The first Quarterly Meeting of the year of the Board of Directors was held at the Ponderosa Inn in Colorado Springs, Saturday, Jan. 26. The following committees made reports: Southwestern Lore, the current issue (Dec. 84) is running late and will be out in February. Membership Committee, a request was made that all chapters inform new members joining in the Fall that they will have to pay dues again the following year. Some chapters give new members a few free months. 1985 Anniversary Committee, a report was given on what some of the chapters around the state were doing to advertise this event. Some good ideas included slide presentations at public places, slide show video taped and submitted to local cable TV stations, articles in local newspapers and magazines, display cases in local museums and libraries and ads on local radio. The Grand Junction chapter reported that the Mimbres bowl with the corn god design which is used as the CAS logo is at their Western Museum. They plan to photograph it and send copies to all chapters.

The new State Archaeologist, Leslie Wildesen, gave her report. She is a delightful and dedicated person. She extended a welcome to everyone to come and see her (only two persons had been there since she took office, one to ask about Rock Art and the other inquiring about funds). She would like to have her office to be a clearing house for information and ideas. Among other projects, she is currently working with the PAAC Board on policies, on burial policies, and on regulations for state permits.

The Lyons Chapter president, William Boyle, extended the invitation to hold the next Quarterly Meeting at C. U., Boulder, in April. The Board of Directors accepted.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING, JAN. 29, 1985

Ann Pipkins, Vice President, introduced the guest speaker, Michael Burney, with a brief resume of his background and involvement in high altitude archaeology. His talk and slide show was entitled "Archaeological Remains in the Tres Ritos Hills, New Mexico". His work in the area revealed the presence of human activity during Archaic times to a greater extent than was previously believed. These people were Rio Grande Anasazi and lived in pueblo style dwellings. Michael is a new Field Director for the Chapter.

Eric Erickson, Chapter member, showed contemporary artifacts and talked briefly on the Indians of Eastern Bolivia.

After a 15 minute recess, President Bill Boyle called the business meeting to order. 34 members were present and 7 visitors. Site Survey updating as a project for the chapter in cooperation with the C. U. Museum was discussed. Warren Church will write up an article to be published in the Feb. Calumet.

It was announced that the PAAC Site Survey class had 10 signed up so far and a notice had been put in the Daily Camera that the class was being held.

Two programs of other chapters were announced with print out of the details available to be picked up. Also a list of books in the Chapter Library was available.

Ann announced the next speaker would be Dr. Bruce Bradley of Crow Canyon. He will talk and demonstrate Lithic Technology.

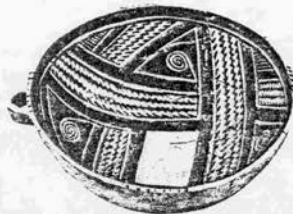
Treasurer Sara White announced there was \$160.48 in the bank.
