



FROM KAY EVATZ, FIELD DIRECTOR

We are offering a FRONT RANGE ARCHAEOLOGY MINICOURSE by Steve Cassells. This minicourse might be our last chance to study with the author of Colorado Archaeology (published 1983) as he has been offered a job out of state. The course will start with a lecture open to the public at our July 30th regular meeting at 7:30 PM. The topic, "Front Range Archaeology". There will be a four day field trip from Aug. 3 to 6 to view the environment of prehistoric sites. We plan to car pool in four cars, four persons to a car with Steve in a different car each day. At night we will primitive camp near the sites. If needed, one car could be used to take people to nearby motels for those who do not wish to camp out. Schedule: Aug. 3rd, leave for Pueblo at 8 AM, pick up people at Denver at 9AM and Pueblo at 12:00 n. After lunch, we will spend the afternoon at sites in the Purgatoire and Apishapa areas. Camp that night. Aug. 4th, start at 8 AM to view rock shelters, rock art and Blakesklee Stone Columns. Camp that night. Aug. 5th, leave for the Denver area. Visit Magic Mountain, Spring Gulch and Nelson Ranch sites. That night sleep at our own homes (can share rooms in my house in Longmnt for out-of-towners). Aug. 6, visit the Dent, Frazier, Jergens and Powers-Paleo Indian sites. After lunch, travel to Laporte to see the Johnson site and the Roberts Buffalo Jump site. Cost of this minicourse is \$75.00 per person plus \$15 to \$20 for gas if you travel with someone else. Registration and full fee must be received by July 13. ALSO FROM KAY

The three Field Directors met to make sure that all the survey crews were doing the same things and to make sure we had a good communication network with the members of the crews. It was decided that we will have three groups, to be knows as the Boulder crew, the Longmont crew and the Historic Site crew. The names have nothing to do with where you live. Anyone can go on any site survey as long as there is room, no more than six to a crew. You may sign up for surveys at the monthly meetings or call the Information person. At present, they are Boulder crew-Louise Derr (449-3419); Longmont crew-Bill Boyle (772-2279); or Historic crew-Kay Evatz (776-6491).

Warren Church, Field Director, will have to have a replacement as he is going to Peru for the next year. He suggested that Mark Chenault, new Graduate Assistant at the C. U. Museum, be asked to replace him. The Information person assignment was necessary as Michael is out of town so much.

The Boulder and Longmont/Historic crews will each have a pack for survey supplies. At present it will have a notebook with necessary forms and sign-up sheets for the crew members, a 30 meter tape and flags. We plan to have another money-making project to enable us to buy another compass (see Steve's class above) so that each crew will have a compass for their use. At present, the compass will be held by Bill or Louise at work. Each crew will go out at least one a month - 1st and 3rd Saturdays for the Boulder and Longmontcrews and the 4th Saturday for the Historic crew.

All efforts will be made to make sure each group has copies of all the maps and that the information people getogether once a month to share information and send the reports into the State office once a month in one packet. All questions and problems should be referred to the Information people. Every effort will be made to get people out on surveys so they can complete requirements for certification. Be patient. This is a new plan and the bugs must be worked out. But you must sign up and show up if you want to go out.

Minutes of the Lyons-CAS Monthly Meeting, May 28, 1985

Vice-President, Ann Pipkins, opened the meeting at 7:40 p.m. in UMC 157, University of Colorado, Boulder campus.

Sharon Pay gave a progress report on Michael Burney's survey crew, Mary Sucke reported on Warren Church's survey crew, and Sara White reported on her survey crew. These survey crews are working on the Boulder County Archaeological Inventory. Kay Evatz reported that the crews will continue their work. Prehistoric surveys will take place every first and third Saturdays of each month; with historic surveys to take place every fourth Saturday of each month. Mark Chenault will replace Warren Church as Field Director. Warren is leaving in June to go down to Peru to work with Jane Wheeler and Tom Lennon. Louise Derr will be the contact person for Michael Burney's group and Bill Boyle will be the contact person for the other groups. A discussion followed pertaining to specific procedures to be be used by the survey crews in order to get them coordinated.

Treasurer, Sara White, reported that Lyons-CAS has a treasury balance of \$332.31.

Discussion was held regarding the purchase of tapes and flags to be used by the survey crews. A motion was unanimously passed to have the Chapter purchase two 30 meter tapes at approximately \$20-30 each and 200 pin flags (22 inches in length) at approximately \$6.50 per hundred. Either Louise Derr or Kay Evatz will take the responsibility of purchasing these supplies for the group.

A brief discussion was held regarding the purchase of $50\,\mathrm{th}$ Anniversary patches. A motion was unanimously passed to have the Treasurer purchase 20 patches from the Montrose Chapter.

An announcement was made about the Perishable Materials class. It will begin on June 11th and will be held at the Lacey's. As of this meeting, there were enough people signed up on the list, however, more people are welcome to add their names to the list.

Discussion was held regarding the Chair position of the Ways and Means Committee. No one volunteered at this time. A motion was unanimously passed that the necessity for this position be discussed at the next Executive Board Meeting.

Ann read a letter from Ivol Hagar that a new CAS Chapter has been started in Carbondale, Colorado. The name of this Chapter is the Roaring Fork Valley Chapter of CAS. They already have 32 paid members with more to come. A hearty welcome to this new Chapter!

Kay Evatz reported on the Historic Longmont Landmark Commission. She said the Commission is trying to establish 3 Historic Districts within Boulder County. A minimum of 50 buildings is required to establish a district which is what is available for surveying at this time. Kay indicated that help is needed in working with the Historic Architect in recording each building. She suggested that before people begin surveying that they first take the Historic Tour of Longmont. Historic surveys will take place every fourth Saturday of each month.

The issue of a new Lyons Chapter t-shirt logo was tabled at this time.

In place of a our regular monthly meeting a barbeque will be held instead. It will be on Saturday, June 29th, noon til ?, at Leni Clubb's house. Everyone should bring a covered dish, something for grill, and something to drink. The Derrs and Mary Sucke have volunteered to assist Leni in setting this event on its way.

SUBJECT: Funding for OAHP and OSAC

At the CAS Board Meeting in Boulder on April 20, 1985, I was asked to outline the funding mechanism for the OAHP, and specifically how the "blue sheets" fit into that mechanism. Here goes.

All staff salaries, equipment, supplies, telephone, copying, travel, and other expenses of the OAHP are funded by an annual federal grant from the Historic Preservation Fund. This fund is part of the Land and Water Conservation Fund, created by Congress to support resource conservation and preservation activities; the source of the money that goes into this fund is offshore oil receipts, not tax dollars. The total grant amount is set by Congress each year; the grant itself is administered by the National Park Service, in accordance with their manuals and regulations.

Each state must apply each year for their share of the grant. The application documents how much work was produced with grant money during the past year, and projects workload and products for the coming year, and each state's share is apportioned based on these factors. In addition, each state must match the amount of the grant as a condition of receiving this federal money.

You will note that the Historic Preservation Fund is intended to pay for activities of the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), not the Office of the State Archaeologist (OSAC). Archaeological activities undertaken in Colorado as authorized by state law have no separate source of funds. Archaeological activities that relate to the federal historic preservation program, such as site file maintenance, federal project review, National Register nomination, and public awareness and training (PAAC) have been funded as part of that program, as described above.

In Colorado, "match" has been generated from several sources: the state provides office space, furniture, utilities, and personnel and accounting

services; volunteers (including CAS members) donate their time to various program activities, such as survey, National Register review, and workshop development; and local governments match any subgrant money disbursed to them either with local funds or volunteer time.

The "blue sheets" are the way CAS members document the monetary value of their donated time. They are not money, nor do they directly generate money. That is, OAHP does not receive \$4.50 each time a "trainee" level person spends an hour on a survey or in a PAAC class. We must, however, demonstrate that for every \$4.50 we spend out of our federal grant, at least \$4.50 (either in cash or in-kind contributions) has been spent by someone else on activities associated with our statewide program; the "blue sheets" provide that proof.

Thus, the "blue sheets" are an important part of the overall funding for archaeological activities in Colorado.
