
#### PAAC CLASSES, Oct. 22,24, Nov. 5,7,12,14, 7 - 9:30 PM



#### EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING, Oct. 23rd, 7:30



#### LYONS CHAPTER REGULAR MEETING, Oct. 29

Our speaker, Dr. Leslie Wildesen, State Archaeologist of Colorado, has prepared an interesting talk and will show slides which will graphically illustrate the subject of her talk "The Impact of Pot Hunting and Vandalism on our Archaeological Resources". Dr. Wildesen received her Ph.D in Anthropology from Washington State University in 1973. She has served as Chief Archaeologist at the Archaeological Research Unit of the University of California (Riverside) and as Regional Archaeologist for the U. S. Forest Service in the Pacific Northwest. She managed Wildesen Associates, a cultural resources planning firm in Portland, Oregon from 1980 until she came to Colorado in October 1984. During that time she was awarded a Congressional Fellowship by the AAA and served as a staff member in the U. S. House of Representatives for 10 months.

She has published articles in American Antiquities and Advances in Archaeological Method and Theory and has contributed to books and meetings on topics ranging from quaternary sedimentation in bogs to the history of ethical problems in the archaeology profession. Her major professional interests are in Quaternary paleoenvironments and archaeological sediments, and in resolving conflicts in archaeological (and other cultural) resource management issues.

AND, she throws the atlatl as a member of the Lyons Chapter.

The Colorado State Museum, 1300 Broadway, Denver, is opening an exhibition, BEAUTIFUL DARING WESTERN GIRLS: WOMEN OF THE WILD WEST SHOWS on October 16th. The exhibition was assembled by the Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, Wyoming. It uses photographs, poster, show costumes, saddles and personal memorabilia to examine the appearance of these cowgirls, their defiance of social conventions, and the stereotypes which subsequently evolved about them. The exhibition will be shown thru January 19th.

White Mesa Institute is offering their third solstice study field trip exploring the Canyonlands area of southeastern Utah searching for suspected archaeoastronomy sites among the Anasazi ruins. #### LYONS CHAPTER HISTORY

As a 50th Anniversary project, the Pike's Peak Chapter, Colorado Springs, has been publishing histories of each chapter in their newsletter, The Midden". Since we have many new members this year that may not know about the Chapter, we are publishing the article written by one of our Directors, Jean Kindig, who is also a Charter Member of the Lyons Chapter.

## LYONS CHAPTER, CAS BY JEAN KINDIG, DIRECTOR

The Lyons Chapter was chartered by CAS in 1982. The Chapter originally met in the Redstone Museum in Lyons. The meetings were changed to Boulder in the Fall of 1983 and are now held on the University of Colorado campus. The monthly meetings are open to the public and have included outstanding speakers from topics on Chimney Rock to Lithic Technology.

There are currently 63 members active in the Lyons Chapter. Approximately 30 people have participated in the PAAC programs, and, to date, 3 members have been certified and several are working toward certification.

Members have participated in several surveys in Boulder County including the White Rocks and Rabbit Mountain, a recent county open space acquisition. The 50th CAS Armiversary project in the "Boulder County Archaeological Site Inventory." In a Co-operative relationship between the Lyons Chapter, the University of Colorado Museum (UCM) and Colorado Preservation Office, members have an opportunity to participate in surveys along the Front Range to update some 63 or more site reports on state forms that were in the UCM site files prior to the formation of the State file system. Updated site reports will then be submitted to the Colorado Preservation office and will also help the UCM to properly document its existing collections from the Sites. The Co-Field Directors have worked out a research design for the project and the first survey was conducted in April of 1985.

A number of members have been volunteering their time and expertise doing lab work for the Yellow Jacket materials at the Museum. Because of their interest, a tour of the Yellow Jacket Field School site was arranged and conducted by Dr. Joe Ben Wheat. This was one stop in the itinerary of the First Annual Chapter Tour which also included conducted tours of the Chimmey Rock Archaeological Reserve and the Lions Canyon in the Ute Mountain Tribal Park.

In March, a four day intensive primative Pottery Workshop was conducted in Boulder by Dr. Bruce Bradley of the Crow Canyon Center for Southwestern Archaeology.

Recently, there has been a weekly workshop designing and making atlatls and spears and testing them on targets. Participating members should have their weapons and skills sharpened by the time of the Pikes Peak Chapter Contest as well as the Annual World Open Atlatl Contest in Saratoga, Wvo.

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Because of the Dynamic leadership and contagious enthusiasm, members of
the Lyons Chapter will continue to contribute and benefit from a variety of
activities in an organization where there is something for everyone.

#### MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING, Sept. 17th

Meeting called to order by Bill Boyle, President, at Cleo Barnes', at 7:30 PM. Eight Board members present. Vice President, Ann Pipkins reported that Dennis Van Gerven would be the speaker for September and Leslie Wildesen for October. She also reported that the membership seems to be picking up due to PAAC classes and interesting speakers at meetings.

Tentative date for the Christmas Party set for Dec. 17th. Place not known yet.

Robin Farrington, Louise Derr and Cleo Barnes were selected to be the Nominating Committee. Jean Kindig moved that we announce the slate of officers at the Oct. 29th meeting at which time nominations will also be called for from the floor. Motion withdrawn.

Leni Clubb reported on PAAC. O D wants list of subjects desired by membership for PAAC courses by time of the Annual Meeting, Oct. 4-5-6. Form were published in Sept. Calumet but not many responses. Membership survey forms will be passed out at Sept. meeting. Discussion was held for places for future PAAC classes. There will be a sign-up sheet for the Lithics class at the Sept. meeting.

Leni also stated that a Atlatl Workshop would be held sometime in Oct.

Copies of the State CAS Constitution and By-laws were passed out. Voting will be held on this revised constitution at the Annual Meeting. Article 17 on Compliance came under considerable discussion. At the Annual Meeting, our CAS Representative will ask for clarification as this seems to be a very controversial issue.

Jean Kindig said she has scheduled a field trip survey for Sept. 21st. They are going to King Lake and will have four participants in this High Altitude survey. Site numbers will be coordinated and duplicate or new numbers will be entered on state site forms .

The Chapter has received a copy of "Local Assistance Grants" guidelines for proposals for funding. We will need financial assistance to continue our Site Inventory Project so that our treasury will not be depleted. Grants are available for projects such as ours from the Colorado Historical Society. The forms will be handed to the news officers for 1986 for their use.

Bill announced that Mark Chenault, C. U. is a possibility for Field Director to replace Warren Church who is Peru for this and next year. The Boulder Survey crew is close to finishing up their Moomaw sites. It was suggested that both groups should combine their efforts to finish up everything they can before winter sets in. Sharon Pay said that the Valmont Butte site listed on our project has been long gone.

The Reburial policy was briefly discussed. All Board members have received copies of Leslie Wildesen's letter and draft in which she requested comments.

Next Board Meeting will be at Mary Derr's, 3410 Everett Dr., Boulder, on Oct. 23 due to conflict with beginning PAAC class on Oct. 22nd. November meeting will be held at Kay evatz in Longmont.

Meeting adjourned at 10:15 PM

#### Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Lyons Chapter, CAS, Sept. 24th.

The meeting was called to order by Ann Pipkins, Vice President, in the President, Bill Boyle's absence. She then introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. Dennis Van Gerven who spoke on "Life and Death in Ancient Nubia". His research was supported by UNESCO for two years and began in 1979 in Sudan with the excavation of 200 graves in a cemetery which dated 550-750 AD. He said that the Christian graves were oriented east to west which is a pre-Christian concept to face the setting sun while the Muslims are facing east. Dr. Van Gerven said that the preservation of young children and infants, as well as adults, is unprecendented with brain tissues, skin, eyelashes, hair, eyeballs still present. Some of the infants, new born, still had the umbilical cord tied with string. He was a clever speaker and kept us laughing with his aside comments.

After a five minute recess, the business meeting was conducted with announcements of speakers for October and November and the Christmas Party date. Schedule of papers for the Annual Meeting was passed out to everyone present to stimulate interest in attending. Membership survey forms were also distributed.

Treasurer, Sara White, reported that there was \$302.70 in the General Fund, with all bills paid to date.

Loni Clubb announced the Atlatl Workshop sign up sheets were available and the meeting would be the last of October.

Bill Boyle, President, arrived and asked for a report from the Nominating Committee. Louise said there were no positions filled yet. Bill asked if anyone was interested in any of the Chairman positions. The Chapter will vote at the November meeting and the new officers will be installed at the December Christmas party. Jean Kindig reported on the High Altitude field trip to survey site 5BL36. She has scheduled it for Oct. 5th as participants are not attending the Annual Meeting. Kay Evatz was not present to give a report on the Historical Survey team effort in Longmont.

Louise Derr reported that ten full sites had been investigated and the crews hope to be finished with the site reports by Thanksgiving. Next survey was tentatively set for Oct. 12th, weather permitting to finish up the Antelope Park sites. Question was raised about artifacts from Federal land to add to the CRM files at C. U. Museum. Leni was requested to inquire from Fred Lange, Curator, if they would be accepted.

Mark Chenault will be contacted for status of reports from the Rabbit Mountain survey conducted by members of the Chapter and C. U. students ad professionals.

There was a short discussion of the changes in the State CAS by-laws led by Bill Boyle, particularly the Article XVII, Compliance, which we must have in our by-laws to comform to IRS standards for Non-profit Organizations.

Meeting adjourned at 9:50 PM
