

U. she was co-director of the Rio Abiseo Project Survey and is now returning to her own research speciality on the origin and evolution of the llama and alpaca.



Individuals participating in an archaeological project should understand the working of a laboratory and should actively participate in processing the information/materials they have collected through the project. The laboratory is closely related to field work and should receive support from all project participants.

AMEMDMENTS ADOPTED BY THE COLORADO ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY AT THE ANNUAL MEETING, MONTROSE, COLORADO, OCTOBER 5, 1985.

ARTICLE VII -- CHAPTERS

Section 2.

m. If a local Chapter becomes inactive for any reason, its Charter, all records, funds, library, equipment, supplies, and other property become the absolute property of the Society and shall be sent to the Executive Secretary or arrangements be made for these materials to be picked up by the Executive Secretary or his/her representative.

ARTICLE XVII -- COMPLIANCE

Section 1.

No part of the net earnings of the Society shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, that the Society shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Section 1 of Article II (OBJECTIVES). No substantial part of the activities of the Society shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Society shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the Society shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

Section 2 of Article XVII requires that each Chapter of the Society include Section 1 in their Bylaws.

The above ARTICLE XVII - COMPLIANCE is required for tax-exempt status for non-profit organizations and will be included in the Lyons Chapter By-laws as ARTICLE VIII - COMPLIANCE. Article VII, Section 2 (above) will appear as ARTICLE IX of the Lyons Chapter By-laws which will be available to members at the November or December meetings and will be distributed to the membership in new member packets or upon request.

We are bound by our affiliation with the Colorado Archaeological Society to adhere to the State Constitution and By-Iaws which now contain these amendments. The wording of Section 1 will read "Lyons Chapter" where the word "Society" appears.

As soon as the Chapter receives the newly revised complete State Constitution and By-Laws, copies will be made available on request.

MINUTES OF THE LYONS CHAPTER EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING, October 23, 1985

The meeting was called to order by Bill Boyle, President, at 8:00 PM, at Mary Derr's, Director, 3410 Everett, Boulder. Six Board members were present. Louise Derr gave the Nominating Committee report - no President yet, possibilities for Treasurer were Sara White, Pat Hatfield and Fred Lange. After a discussion, Bill and Leni Clubb announced that they would serve as Co-Presidents and share the duties.

Louise Derr suggested getting a copy of the Jack Moomaw book, "Life of a Rocky Mountain Ranger" and trying to find a copy of Moomaw's poems in old Arizona Hiways magazine, in connection with the survey project of many of the old sites surveyed by Moomaw, as there may be more infomation on the old surveys included.

Bill said that speakers for November and January had been secured and he has made arrangements for rooms for January and February with the Anthro. Dept. The March meeting may be moved up due to Spring Break and the difficulty of having the rooms for an adequate time span during the Break period. Sharon Pay was instructed to try to get Tim Baugh, a new Associate Professor in the Anthro. Dept., to speak for the February meeting on Athapascan Pottery. The Meltons of Estes Park were suggested for speakers for March to talk about Jack Moomaw.

Discussion was held regarding the Christmas Party. Possible location to be the Clubhouse at 5000 Butte. Sharon said if she would inquire but that there could be no alcohol served. The Board agreed to provide egg nog and/or punch and to ask members to bring "munchies". A Party Committee will be appointed. We will ask members to bring slides of Chapter activities or "What they did last Summer".

Bill said that he plans to donate a collection of slides of Chapter activities to the Chapter library. This brought up the subject of purchasing a slide carousel and have members donate other slides of Lyons Chapter activities to prepare a slide program on Lyons Chapter, CAS. This could be shown to other interested groups.

It was announced that the Blue Sheets should be sent to Ray Lyons, State CAS, no later than the seventh day past the end of the quarter. This includes the White sheets used by Chapter officers and the Survey Crews. All blue sheets should be in the hands of the Chapter Secretary immediately after the end of the quarter for transmittal to State CAS.

FIELD REPORTS: Both crews' goal is to have the field work and paper work, along with a brief written descriptive report of the crews' activities for the year, completed by November 30th.

Discussion of new projects for 1986 included, 1) "Cleaning up" the Rabbit Mountain field reports at soon as possible. Pencil reports now in hands of 0 D for his review. 2) Secure oral histories to go with all survey field reports. 3) Possible plant/botany talks by William Weber, C. U. Museum, to meet in Museum classroom. 4) Louise Derr will help coordinate "data base" on Front Range flora/ethnobtany on the computer with another person helping. 5) APPDAR project - possibility of getting a geography student to do an independent study of old aerialphotos in the C. U. Museum archives of Boulder County archaeological sites to be arranged thru the museum and the geography departments.

Bill said it was necessary to set up a budget for next year based on what we spent this year, our membership and projection for 1986.

Leni was instructed to write 0 D, PAAC Coordinator, informing him of the Chapter choices for PAAC classes for 1986. We want, if possible, Field & Lab Photography, Colorado Archaeology, Research Design and Report Writing and Dating Methods in that order. Dating Methods can be changed to another class for the new members.

Leni reported on the Atlatl Workshop to be held at her house Oct.26th.

Annual membership dues need to be into the State CAS by the first part of January to insure members receiving Southwestern Lore for the first quarter without expensive additional packaging and postage. We will ask the Lyons Chapter members to have their dues paid by December 31st.

Bill gave a short report on the Annual Meeting and will present a more complete report at the Regular Meeting. He announced that the next Quarterly Meeting of State CAS would be held January 25th in Pueblo. The next Annual Meeting will be held October 3, 4, 5 in Colorado Springs. Bill mentioned that Southwestern Lore needed short articles. Also the 1986 Plains Conference will be held in Denver November 21st thru 23rd and CAS is the host.

Leni reported that a letter had been received from the Landmark Commission of Longmont announcing a meeting on Nov. 7th. She notified Kay Evatz and Kay will attend that meeting.

The next Executive Board meeting will be held at Kay Evatz', 2121 Squires, Longmont on November 19th at 7:30 PM. Meeting adjourned at 10 PM.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE LYONS CHAPTER, Oct. 29

After an interesting talk by Dr. Leslie Wildesen, State Archaeologist, on "Impact on our Archaeological Resources", the business meeting was called to order by Ann Pipkins, Vice President, in the President's absence. She reported on the schedule of speakers for Nov. and also Jan. and Feb.

Sara White, Treasurer, gave the Treasurer's Report: Balance in First National Bank, Boulder, as of Oct. 29th is \$294.87 with all bills paid. She also reported that eight new members for 1986 had been signed up as a result of the PAAC Lithics class.

Leni Clubb gave a report on the Atlatl Workshop held Oct. 26. Thirteen members participated. Next workshop Nov. 30th. She also reported that a letter had been written to 0 D Hand requesting PAAC classes for1986.

Survey Crews' Reports: Kay Evatz reported on the progress of the Historical Site survey in connection with the Longmont Historical Landmarks Commission. She will attend a meeting Nov. 7th of the Commission. Ann Pipkins reported that the Longmont crew is on schedule and the Boulder crew has some work to complete before submitting the reports to OSAC. Goals for 1986 - Oral histories on sites surveyed and a Lithic Materials Workshop.

Sharon Pay announced a CCPA & WPA meeting in Laramie, Wyo., Nov. 2 & 3. Sharon also gave Bill Boyle's report on the Annual Meeting in Montrose. (Bill's complete report on file in Chapter archives) Important points: CAS members approved revisions in the by-laws bringing CAS into compliance with IRS tax exempt status requirements, creating the office of Treasurer and a standing Audit Committee, and establishing procedures for handling expenses and profits from Annual Meetings. Chapters must add Article on Compliance to their by-laws by end of 1st quarter 1986. Ivol Hagar reported CAS membership at 1150. Marcia Tate will name a committee to study the feasibility of a State-wide newsletter. 1986 Officers for CAS are Victoria Sounart (Royal Gorge Chapter)-President; Marcia Tate (Denver Chapter) - Vice President; Barbara Dodge (Pikes Peak Chapter) - Treasurer; Susan Ooton (Pueblo Chapter) - Recording Secretary. The 1986 Plains Conference will be held in Denver Nov. 21-23. Assistance of at least one member from each Chapter is requested. Sponsored Funds - (Blue & White Sheet Match funds) for first two quarters was \$54,187.55 with Lyons Chapter submitting \$8,300.50 of the total. Southwestern Lore has put out a request for Memoirs and also 10 to 15 page articles.

The floor was opened for nominations for officers for 1986. The slate of officers was read: Co-Presidents Bill Boyle and Leni Clubb, Vice President James Brooks, Secretary Mary Sucke, Treasurer Fred Lange. Nomination of Mary Derr was made from floor, moved and seconded. Position of Treasurer now stands as: Treasurer - Fred Lange and Mary Derr. Members will vote at the November meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 10 PM.
