



LYONS CHAPTER REGULAR MEETING, 7:30 PM, Hellems Bldg., Rm. #199, C. U. Campus

Dr. Fred Lange, Curator of the C. U. Museum, Henderson Bldg., C. U. Campus, Boulder, has given us a really tricky title of his lecture for this meeting. "Donning the Yellow Jacket. Winning The Masters in Southwestern Colorado". Many of you know that Yellow Jacket is the site of the Field School held in S/W Colorado near Cortez for the past thirty years or so supervised by Dr. Joe Ben Wheat. Last year Dr. Lange and Dr. Wheat co-supervised the excavations and many exciting artifacts and unusual structures were found. This is Southwestern Archaeology at its finest! Lange will be showing slides of many of the finds, as well as some of the potential sites to be excavated in the future. Don't miss this slide lecture by a very clever and funny speaker.

PLAN AHEAD FOR THESE COMING EVENTS

February meeting - Dr. Timothy Baugh, Dept. of Anthropology, C. U. Campus, speaking on his work in Oklahoma. Dr. Baugh will be teaching a class on "Plains Anthropology" next semester at C. U. The Chapter has not had a speaker on Plains Anthropology or Archaeology in the past so this lecture should open up a new avenue of interest for many of us.

February - PAAC Class on Laboratory & Field Photography beginning on Feb. 13th, with two more classes on Feb. 20 and 27. See the December Calumet for the outline of this course, also time and place. SARATOGA, WYOMING---THE ATLATL CAPITAL OF THE WORLD

For the 6th successive year prominent professional and avocational archaelogists from many states will again gather in Saratoga, July 19, for the Archae Doings at the 7th Annual Folk Fair and Old Time Trout Fry. Saratoga, on the North Platte River in Southeastern Myoming, is where the elevation exceeds the population by about 5586.

Archaelogy, a department of the Historical and Cultural Association, will again sponsor the Flintknapping Demonstrations, Camp Paleo and the 6th Annual World Open Atlatl Contest.

COLORADO ARCHAEOLOGY FAIR - We have received an invitation thru one of our members, Robin Farrington, to participate in a Colorado Archaeology Fair with students who were involved in a minicourse conducted by the Denver Museum of Natural History called "Man the Tool Maker". Robin, who is employed at DMNH, tells us that they plan a Spring 1986 metro-area competition and a Summer 1986 world competition (both dates to be announced) DMNH plans an Atlatl competition with prizes awarded for distance and accuracy as well as flintknapping and related prehistoric crafts demonstrations. Their purpose in presenting this Fair is"to initiate an annual, public celebration of the interrelationship between man and his tools throughout time, and to eventually provide a format for the dissemination of archaeological information, a showcase for student projects, and increased public awareness of information and concerns related to Colorado Archaeology." DIG AT HONEYMOON RUINS, NEAR CORTEZ - Have you ever wanted to try your hand at real Southwestern style excavating? Did you know that some of the great finds in the archaeological world have been found by amateur (or if you prefer) avocational archaeologists? This summer you will be able to try your trowel and whisk broom out on the Honeymoon Ruins and dig with your fellow CAS members from all over the state. We have been asked to coordinate our members for this event which starts May 24th thru July 5th. They can handle as many as twenty people a week and would like sign-ups for at least a week at a time. We will have sign-up sheets available at the next four meetings (Jan.thru April) but space is filling up. We published articles on this dig in both the August and December Calumet and will have information at the meetings. This is a great way to spend a week of your vacation...or even more if you like.

BOULDER COUNTY ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE INVENTORY PROJECT - Snow and winter weather has curtailed our activities on this project, but we hope to get an early start this Spring. Both crews have been working hard on completing the reports for sites surveyed in 1985 and plan to have them in O D's hands before the end of January. The so-called "Longmont" crew has a new Field Director, Sue Struthers. Warren Church, Field Director for the crew when we started the project last year, went to Peru with the Gran Pajaten expedition and stayed to study at Trujillo on a Fulbright scholarship. Sue is a C. U. graduate working on her Masters in Anthropology and her major focus at this time is working with Dr. Jane Wheeler on camelid bones from Telarmachay, Peru. (They recently received 3 tons of the bones). Struthers is experienced in survey and other phases of archaeology and we are very happy that she will work with us on this important project. Keep watching this newsletter for the announcements of the surveys starting up again. Also later on there will be sign-up sheets for those who want to participate.

SUMMER FIELD TRIP - The August field trip conducted by Steve Cassells to sites from the Apishapa River in S/E Colorado to near Ft. Collins in No. Colorado was such a tremendous success that Kay Evatz, who organized the trip for the Lyons Chapter, has announced that Willard Louden, of Trinadad, has offered to conduct another field trip of many sites in that area. EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING, LYONS C.A.S., 12-14-85

Bill Boyle, Co-President, called meeting to order at 10 a.m. at home of Co-President Leni Clubb, Niwot; 9 members present.

Bowles outlined plans for the Christmas party on December 17. He discussed future programs and meeting places. The March Chapter meeting will be one week earlier than usual, March 18, due to C.U. Spring Break. Boyles is still finalizing Helems 199, our usual meeting place.

Discussion followed on transfer of duties of Chapter officers. Final reports of 1985 officers to be submitted to Boyles. Field directors are also to submit final reports for year. All field directors said written reports on summer surveys just about completed.

Poyles asked that future Executive Board Meetings be tightened up. 1986 activities, progress and workshops were discussed in depth. Peter Thristianson will superwise youth activities for our younger members. Suggestions for future programs and/or workshops included APDAR, soils, cartography, orienteering, ethno-botany, rock identification among others.

Clubb called attention to packets distributed. Field directors are to have some plans to present by January Executive Board meeting.
