






PAAC CIASS "COLORADO ARCHAEOLOGY", May 15-22-29-June 12-19, 7-9PM

This course is a general survey of Colorado prehistory and early history. It discusses the various stages of prehistoric and historic native American development, time and regional relations, lifestyles, traits, and origins. The course is necessary for understanding cultural affiliation and cultural use of a region. Anyone remotely interested in Colorado archaeology should take this course offered in our PAAC program. It is also the second requirement for Provisional Surveyor certification. If you have had the class in Basic Site Survey and Archaeo. Ethics, there is no charge for the class, otherwise the cost is \$10.00 payable to PAAC at time of first session. Eighteen persons have signed up so far. 


Rabbit Mountain Survey continued

On June 1st, we hope to have a full two crews to re-survey the sites to be completed and survey two more areas to finish up the project for the Boulder County Parks and Open Space Commission which we started in 1984 in cooperation with the Anthropology Club of C. U. Pick up a flyer which has a map and additional information at the May 27th meeting. At a recent Field Director's meeting, it was decided that we would finish up the Parks and Open Space project before we started on our other project of re-surveying the old Boulder County sites investigated by Jack Moomaw in the 1940's and 1950's. Two crews worked on the sites last year but we have about 40 sites left to survey. We need all the help we can get. There will be sign-up sheets at meetings with dates we plan to go out so here is your chance to participate in a worthwhile project, get out into the beautiful outdoors, and, for those who have taken the Basic Site Survey PAAC class, a chance to complete the requirements for making out reports for Provisional Surveyor certification. If you are unable to attend the May 27th meeting, call the following and indicate that you plan to go: Sharon Pay (443-3042), Sue Struthers (776-2350). To car pool from Boulder, meet at the C. U. Museum parking lot at 7:15 AM or be at the Rabbit Mt. parking lot at 8 AM. Bring lunch or snack, water, sunscreen, back pack, field book or note book, and survey gear if you have any. We have arranged for another fascinating lecture and slide presentation for this meeting!! Dr. John A. (Jack) Eddy, Astrophysicist and Director of the Office for Interdisciplinary Research, UCAR, will speak on "Mystery of the Medicine Wheels", an illustrated review of the stone medicine wheels of Colorado, Montana, Alberta, and Saskatchewan.

Dr. Eddy received his B.S. at the U. S. Naval Academy and his Ph.D. at the University of Colorado, Boulder. Prior to becoming Director for Interdisciplinary Research, UCAR, he was Senior Scientist of the High Altitude Observatory, National Center for Atmospheric Research, Boulder. At C. U., Boulder, where he was a Professor Adjoint from 1977 to 1984, he taught Solar Physics, Infrared Astronomy, Astroarchaeology, Introductory Astronomy, etc. Eddy has held many national and international offices and served on many committees having to do with astronomy and atmospheric sciences. He has published three books, A New Sun, The New Solar Physics, and The Ancient Sun, and has 116 articles to his credit including seven or more on medicine wheels.

Don't miss this extremely interesting lecture. This will be our last formal lecture until September. June will be the Annual Picnic and August a workshop.

The groups will meet at the Rabbit Mountain parking area and be divided into teams, and also to select the sites for each crew for that day. Sites are in area A and F according to Bob Nykamp's maps.
