



IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN!!! This is the first reminder that 1987 CAS and Chapter dues are due by January 1, 1987. Please renew as soon as possible. To participate in our Workshops, Field Trips, etc. it is required that you have a current membership.

Also, some of you may not realize that CAS has a Code of Ethics to which we adhere as members. Following is a copy of Article XXI -- Code of Ethics from the Constitution and By-Laws of the Colorado Archaeological Society. Our Chapter By-Laws subscribe to this code in Article II, Section D, - Purpose. In this way we show respect and concern of a heritage that is not mine...or yours....but OURS.

Section 1.
Members of the Colorado Archaeological Society agree as follows:
1. Members will uphold State and Federal Antiquities Laws.

- Excavation of archaeological sites will be conducted only according to
 professionally accepted procedures developed in consultation with a
 professional archaeologist and with the written permission of the land
 owner. The investigator has the responsibility for publication of the
 results of his/her investigation and for making the collection available
 for further scientific study.
- 3. Members are encouraged to report archaeological sites to the Office of the State Archaeologist on State Site Survey Forms. Materials collected from the surface sites shall be catalogued and described in the Site Survey Report. Collected materials should either be deposited with the State Archaeologist's office or made available for scientific study.
- Members will not support illegal or unscientifically conducted activities by participating in or condoning the sale, exchange, or purchase of artifacts obtained from such sites.
- Members who exhibit artifacts will do so in an educational context. Items from burials and objects considered sacred will not be exhibited.
- Members will cooperate with the State Archaeologist and other persons and agencies concerned with archaeology and related fields.
- Members will respect the dignity of groups whose culture histories are the subject of archaeological investigation.
- Members will not participate in conduct involving dishonesty, deceit, or misrepresentation about archaeological matters.

Meetings from then on have been held at the University of Colorado. The membership voted to retain the name Lyons Chapter out of respect for the place it was chartered. Our logo is a Classic Mimbres B/W bowl of the Mimbres Phase III Period from the Eby Ruin, New Mexico. The bow is part of the Earl Morris collection housed at the University Museum and was suggested as our logo by one of our charter members who copied the design. Our newsletter, THE CALUMET, was selected by the membership from several suggested, The Calumet was used

extensively by the Plains tribes for ritual smoking at ceremonies. The chapter also has a Calumet, or "Peace Pipe", made by one of our members which is displayed at meetings, along with our Charter, both of which are presented to the incoming President at installation ceremonies at the Christmas Party.

As we have so many new members in 1986, we thought that many of you might want to know more about your Chapter, its purpose, its benefits and its history. We urge you to renew as soon as possible...and by January 1, 1987. Soon after the first of the year, pick up a green Membership Survey at any of our activities, fill it out to help us get to know you better.
