



LYONS CHAPTER REGULAR MEETING, MARCH 31, 7:30 PM, Rm. 199, Hellems Bldg.

We are fortunate in having Dr. "Jack" Eddy, NCAR, for our March meeting. He spoke to us last year in May on the medicine wheels of Montana. This year he speaks on one of his favorite subjects - Sunspots. The title of his slide lecture is "The Search for the Ancient Sun". Frank Gay, a freelance writer from Boulder wrote in the July 20, 1986 Denver Post Magazine, "....no cop stalked a killer along a trail more twisting than scientist Jack Eddy chased the truth about sun and earth in the great solar system whodunit he calls the case of the missing sunspots." Eddy investigated a missing link - an obscure claim that the spots on the sun has almost disappeared during the 70 coldest years known in Europe as the "Little Ice Âge", from 1645 to 1715. Dr. Eddy calls the sunspots "the sun's bits of temper", but adds, "The sun is our friend". In case you don't think the subject has to to with archaeology...this is Environmental Archaeology as well as Astroarchaeology.

Dr. John Eddy received his B.S. at the U.S. Naval Academy and his Phd at the University of Colorado, Boulder. He is presently Director for Interdisciplinary Research for UCAR. He has taught Solar Physics, Infrared Astronomy, Astroarchaeology, and Introductory Astronomy. Eddy has held many national and international offices and served on many committees having to do with astronomy and atmospheric sciences. He has three books published, A New Sun, The New Solar Physics, and The Ancient Sun. Don't miss hearing this interesting and personable man.





Clubb & Evatz will offer one in Yucca uses in July. Mapping rescheduled for May 3rd. Raindate following Sunday. Suggestions for site offered-Cottonwood Trail near NBI or trail near intersection of Broadway and 28th. There has been some interest in repeating Orienteering.
