

### **Field Directors Report**

The First Official Lyons Chapter survey of the season was held at White Rocks on Sunday, May 31. Five dedicated hikers turned out despite the cancelation of the mapping workshop. The weather was ideal - blue skies with enjoyable sunshine and temperatures.

The survey concentrated on exploring a series of low sandstone cliffs overlooking the north side of Boulder Creek. We found several small rock shelters and one large enough to call a cave. All had sufficient floor deposits to hold archaeological remains, however heavy vegetation hampered the view and no artifacts were found. The large cave had a running seep spring and the ceiling appeared to have been smoked, so it would be almost unimaginable that it was not used for camping sometime during the last 10,000 years. Previous surveys of the main White Rocks cliffs nearby have found some chipped and groundstone artifacts, so we know people were in the area. Hopefully, a future investigation will be more productive.

The exciting find of the survey was an inscription on the cliff which reads "J D Walker 1883". A previous Lyons Chapter survey found historic graffiti and one of the goals of our survey was to relocate it and record it. I do not know if this inscription was the one found before or if we made a new discovery. We found a lot of graffiti on the rocks in the same area, so it is possible that there is more to locate and that the one found before needs to be relocated. One other inscription claimed to date to 1913, others ranged from 1944 to 1975. All were names, with one person adding a religious symbol to his inscription. Bill Maxon recorded the 1883 carving on the State site forms to help satisfy the requirements for his provisional surveyor certificate.

The survey we did was by no means complete for the area, and it is hoped that the Lyons Chapter surveyors will continue to work on the White Rocks project. We will need to put together a report of our work there soon. Although we did not turn up much of archaeological importance on this trip, all agreed that it was a fun day. We felt privileged to be allowed to enter a conservation area normally closed to the public. We enjoyed the abundant wildlife, sunshine and nature, and the main ingredient to any archaeological survey-great company and comraderie.

So, lets all you couch potatoes and arm chair archaeologists answer the next call to the field. We will be out again as soon as we can plan another date.

#### Bits & Pieces From The Prez.



## Desert Wind

fter almost two weeks of relatively "cool" weather due to high velocity wind from the

west, we are now experiencing the expected warmer (spelled HOT) days of temperatures from the 104°-106° to 80°'s at night, but we are adjusting to it rather well, we think and have even planted two new acacia trees this morning in our yard.

The desert is fascinating....changing its appearance according to the time of day and the nights are beautiful with canopies of stars and a sliver of moon. We learn a bit of desert lore each day - the little settlement of Coyote Wells which no longer exists, not far from us was so named not because of the coyotes which range the desert, but because when the water level drops low in the summer, the coyotes dig deep basins to get down far enough to get a drinkthus, Coyote Wells.

Plans for the new IVC Desert Museum and Information Center here in Ocotillo are moving right along. Our Planning Committee met recently and we will be working to develop space, design, and topographic plans. The bill to transfer the land to the Museum from the BLM has passed by the House of Representatives and now must be passed by the Senate-we hope before the summer recess in August. A groundbreaking ceremony is planned for the fall. The plans call for a museum, small auditorium and slide projection room, information exhibits on the desert and Imperial Valley, book store, gift shop, gallery for local arts & Crafts, 2 1/2 acre botanical garden, 3 acre archaeological park, 1 acre geological park, and desert tortoise habitat, self-guided tours and picnic area. In addition, nature tours will conduct visitors onto the Yuha Mesa to view geoglyphs, natural and historic sites. It is very exciting to be a part of the planning of such a great project.

I hope many of you are planning on attending the Second Annual CAS Encampment at McPhee Reservoir, July 3, 4, and 5th. I have completed making all of the awards for the Atlatl Contest and Indian Games and have been checking over my atlatl equipment. Competition should be keen this year with so many other CAS members making atlatls. Hope you all are practicing like mad to keep up the Lyons Chapter image of being winners! 
\*\*Education: Only Jean Kindig has responded to the request for educational program volunteers.




