

Obsidian Quarry Yields Artifacts

RANDLE, Wash. — Archaeologists have found almost 6,000 artifacts made of obsidian, a black volcanic glass, at a 6,250-year-old quarry near Mount Adams

Forest Service archaeologists with the Gifford Pinchot

National Forest are busy classifying objects from what they have labeled "a major archaeologic discovery."

"This is the first such obsidian quarry so far discovered in the state of Washington," said district archaeologist Janet Liddle. "It is the only known source of obsidian in the state." the state.

The site, known to scientists as 45-LE 286, also is one of the earliest discovered in the southern Cascades, archaeologist Rick McClure said.

"Carbon-dating of charcoal fragments established dates of 6,250 years ago," McClure said.

"Obsidian spear points from this site have been identified at five other camp sites as far away as 25 miles," added Liddle. "Spear points from the Layser Cave site have been carbon-dated as 6,650 years old."

The location of the quarry is not being revealed, to dis-

The location of the quarry is not being revealed, to discourage vandalism. But the Layser Cave camp site has been opened to the public, marked by an intrepretive sign, on a remote logging road north of the Cispus Learning

The artifacts are being held in the archaeology laboratory at the Cispus center, about eight miles southeast of the forest's Randle district ranger station, until they are ready for public display, Liddle said.

McClure and Liddle learned of the obsidian cache in a book written by the late U.S. Supreme Court justice, William O. Douglas, who was reared in the area. Douglas wrote in his book "Of Men and Mountains" that he had climbed a ridge north of Mount Adams in 1915 and found an obsidian quarry.

"We climbed the ridge north of Mount Adams at the 6,700-foot elevation and found round cobbles of obsidian formed during a volcanic eruption," Liddle said. "We found a big quarry site filled with pre-formed blanks of obsidian. Evidently the cobbles had been shaped into blanks ready for fashioning into spear points. . . . and arrowheads. They would then be transported to permanent camp sites to be finished.
"We made a test excavation about 3 feet square," Liddle

said. "Every 4 inches we found about 1,000 blanks in the first stage of tool making. No finished points were found, but two of the blanks had been worked on both sides, the

first step in shaping a spear point.
"A massive eruption of Mount St. Helens 3,500 years ago covered most of the area with up to 5 feet of pumice, killing every living thing, but wind and weather over the centuries had uncovered this site." Liddle explained.

Ethnographers report that Indians used to set up camp

in the high country each August, Liddle said. The women picked berries while the men hunted mountain goats for their wool and their horns.

A similar quarry featuring chalcedony, a kind of quartz, has recently been excavated at Council Lakes For-est Service campground, Liddle said, and excavation will start next week on a campsite just outside the gates of the Iron Creek Campground.

"This site appears to be a major camp used by the In-dians over a long period of time," she said.
