

THINGS YOU WOULDN'T KNOW IF YOU DIDN'T GO ON SURVEYS: There are a few good rock alignments in Boulder County! Two surveys in the past two weeks revealed three such structures.

Two were found southwest of Lyons, and the third located a couple

of miles north of Boulder on Open Space land.

On March 16, Laura Viola, Sue and I made a preliminary investigation of a rock alignment near Lyons. This structure, about one meter high and approximately 400 meters long, is located on private property. During the investigation, Laura and Sue also discovered a second alignment approximately two kilometers from the first. (They were checking out the area while I was searching for any evidence of a meat processing area.) They also discovered a rock shelter, but did not have time to investigate it.

The third alignment was located on March 23 during a survey led by Dock Teegarden on Open Space land north of Boulder. This structure has a total estimated length of nearly a kilometer. The basal portion of a

side-notched projectile point was found by Steve Montgomery in

association with the upper portion of the structure. An IF will be submitted to Kevin Black.

High Altitude Archaeology Exhibit at Boulder Public Library

Don't miss the remarkable High Altitude Archaeology Exhibit created by eight members of the Indian Peaks Chapter in conjunction with ARCHAEOLOGY PRESERVATION WEEK. The 16 foot display occupies two cases in the Bridge Gallery of the Boulder Public Library. It will be on continuous display during the month of April.

The display contains a photographic exhibit and text describing the work of a renowned archaeologist, James Benedict, who for the past twenty years has studied prehistoric occupations of the Colorado front range. His work reveals the lifestyle of Native Americans, (going back 10,000 years), along the continental divide in what is now the Indian Peaks Wilderness and Rocky Mountain National Park.

The exhibit was a highly successful cooperative project. A new member of our Executive Board, Steve Montgomery of Montgomery Partnership Architecture, developed the concept for the exhibit, solicited the funds for production, and provided the leadership to see it through. Jean Kindig's text is based on Benedict's 1991 paper "People of the Shining Mountains - High Altitude Cultural Ecology on the Colorado Front Range". Bill Maxson contributed an explanation of CAS and its purposes. Anita McHugh typeset the text. Janet Lever's art work added warmth and grace. Brent Wheeler, Jeannie Hamilton and Ann Hayes also made important contributions to the project. James Benedict was most generous by being available for consultation and in providing unpublished photos that suited the theme of the exhibit.

Besides encouraging archaeological awareness and preservation in our own backyard, the finely crafted exhibit is a real work of art. Go on up to the Bridge Gallery and have a look.

Ann participated in two articles printed in <u>Southwestern Lore</u>. The December, 1989 issue contains "A Partial Re-inventory of Boulder County Sites" which she co-authored with Sharon Pay, Pat Hatfield and Louise Derr. The summer, 1990 issue contains her article "A Survey of Computer Applications in Archaeology".
