Slide and Lecture by MICHAEL BURNEY on "The Archaeology of Dowe Flats".

Many of you are familiar with Rabbit Mountain, near Lyons, and the cultural resources on this Boulder County Open Space property. To the west of Rabbit Mountain is a sheltered valley, sloping down to the South St. Vrain river, known as **Dowe Flats**. It is privately owned land on which the Southwest Portland Cement Company is proposing to develop a limestone quarry.

Dowe Flats was a popular campsite for prehistoric Front Range cultures since at least Late Archaic times and probably much earlier. We know this, in part, from the archaeological survey and testing work which Michael Burney has conducted for the land owners since 1987.

One notable rich 1x1x3.7 meter test pit, (shored and braced), yielded C14 dates of +/- 2610 B.P. on material at 222 cm. below the surface. Faunal remains of bison, deer and pronghorn sheep were found and 247 artifacts were retrieved.

These dense cultural deposits should guarantee the eligibility of the site for landmark status since they suggest an extraordinary record of Front Range history.

Michael will share with us his work at Dowe Flats and its context in the archaeology of the surrounding area of Rabbit Mountain, Indian Mountain and Indian Gap.

SWALLOW SITE - JUNE 19.

Bill Hammond's excellent slide talk on the Swallow Site, (presented at the April 27 IPCAS Regular Meeting), stimulated interest in visiting the site and participating in the dig. IPCAS is planning a group excursion to the site on Saturday, June 19, Our intention is to meet at the Table Mesa Park and Ride, (junction of Table Mesa and Rte 36), at 8:00 a.m. and car pool to the site. The Swallow Site is located on the Ken Carl Ranch Oproperty, 10 miles SE of Littleton, Call Ann Hayes (494-3773) if you would like to come along.

Denver CAS has been excavating the Swallow site for the past 11 years. It is a multi-component site dating from the Middle and Late Archaic, Ceramic, and Historic time periods, situated in the hogback valley under the west-facing overhang of a large sandstone outcropping. This ancient rock shelter site has much to teach about the lifeways of the early inhabitants of the hogback valley.

Bill, who has been digging at the Swallow Site since 1983, told us that there are about 5 more years of work to go, and that, so far, more than 20,000 items have been curated, with most of the lab work being carried out by members of the Denver CAS Chapter. They would welcome help from IPCAAS with both the dig and the lab work.

Any person over 12 years is welcome to assist. Physical requirements include kneeling for extending periods, climbing ladders and being in hot sun.

Bring a light jacket for morning and light clothes for the afternoon, sunscreen, lunch and snacks, water, sun hat, tools for excavating are required. A metric tape is, however most useful. For more information about the site, call Fred Rathbun (973-2319 or Bill Hammond (333-2984).

1993 High Altitude Archaeology Project

Help save a cultural resource and camp in the beautiful 4th of July Valley! Volunteers are needed from July 5 - 10 to work on the salvage and analysis of seven prehistoric hearths at site 5BL153 that are threatened by recreational use on the Arapahoe Pass Trail in Indian Peaks Wilderness.

Analysis of the hearth materials will contribute to our knowledge of how and if the use of this site is related to the nearby game drives along the Continental Divide.

In the summer of 1992 IPCAS volunteers executed a joint venture with the Forest Service to salvage a single hearth out of the trail where it crosses site 5BL153. No formal excavation had ever been done on this well known site. Jim Benedict, Colorado's foremost high country archaeologist directed the excavation. The hearth yielded lithic debitage and a charcoal sample which radiocarbon dated @ 855 +/- 55 B.P.

While working on the '92 hearth we observed numerous other hearths weathering out of the banks of the trail where the Forest Service is planning a trail reconstruction project. IPCAS is now negotiating an expansion of our original agreement with the Forest Service to retrieve the materials in these hearths this summer, again under Jim Benedict's direction, and issue a final report on the combined results of the '92 and '93 seasons. 


