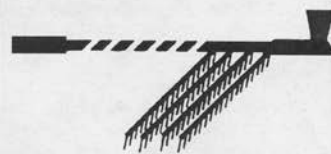

IPCAS TOUR - ROCK CREEK

On **Saturday, August 14**, Pete Gleichman will conduct two tours especially for IPCAS members who are **not** on crew at Rock Creek. This will be an opportunity to see personally a bit of authentic history right in our own backyard.

The Rock Creek Camp (5BL2712) has been listed on the State Register of Historic Properties. The Early Archaic portion of the site has been dated to 6070 BP from radio-carbon tests of charcoal from the hearth.

The tours will be conducted at 9:00 am and 1:30 pm. Because of limited parking at Rock Creek and widening of HW 287 we will meet at **8:30 am and 1:00 pm** at the Broomfield Park and Ride at 120th and Wadsworth and car pool to the site. **Directions from Boulder:** Take HW 36 to the Broomfield exit. Go about 1 block south on old Wadsworth, at the 2nd traffic intersection after leaving HW 36. Entrance to Park & ride is on the right. **Reservations are required for the tour. GRAVEROBBER SENTENCED - Salt Lake City, Utah

A Tennessee man who pleaded guilty to desecrating the ancient grave of an Anasazi Indian child has been placed on probation and ordered to pay \$6,000 in fines and restitution.

Carl A. Hulan, 24, of Shelbyville, Tenn., also must perform 200 hours of community service for misdemeanor violations of the Archaeological Resources Protection Act.

**COURT UPHOLDS GUILT IN ARTIFACTS
LOOTING - Chicago, Illinois.**

A federal appeals court panel in Chicago has upheld the conviction of a southern Indiana man accused of selling artifacts looted from a centuries-old Indian burial mound.

A three-judge panel of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said a federal law that prohibits illegal trafficking in artifacts was intended to protect archaeological sites on private property as well as those on land owned by the federal government or Indian tribes.

The ruling this past week is significant because it was the first time a federal appeals court panel had addressed the issue.

Most criminal prosecutions under the Archaeological Resource Protection Act of 1979 involve thefts from ancient sites on federal land or Indian-owned property.

Lawyers for Arthur Gerber, a professional photographer in Tell City, Indiana, and founder of one of the nations largest Indian-artifact shows, had argued that the statute was never intended to protect sites on private property.

ANCIENT POINT FOUND -Steamboat Springs, CO

A 10 year-old Texas girl hiking on Rabbit Ears Pass has found a Folsom point estimated to be 11,000 years old.

Amanda Kious turned over the 2-inch projectile of petrified wood to the U.S. Forest Service. The point is from either a spear or an atlatl dart. An atlatl is about 3 feet long and is flung using a special throwing board, said **Sue Struthers**, archaeologist for Routt National Forest.
