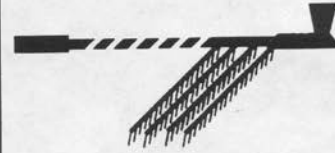

**MULTI-DISCIPLINARY INVESTIGATIONS ON THE PAWNEE NATIONAL GRASSLAND, UNC - SOUTH PLATTE PROJECT**

**Robert Brunswig, Jr.** of the Dept of Anthropology at UNC-Greeley, will speak to us about the project he and his students have been involved in for countless hours out on the Pawnee National Grasslands.

Amongst the 250,000 acres that encompass the grassland, are specifically 440 acres that include an average of 62 known sites per square mile. These sites range from the historic period to 10,000 years ago.

Numerous tepee rings, rock shelters, a 6,000 yr. old Mt. Albion projectile point, stone scrapers, knives, arrowheads, tiny pieces of bison and antelope bones have been found and documented.

In the Winter 1993 edition of *Southwestern Lore*, Bob authored an article on the Plains Woodland secondary burials located at the Ehrlich Site near Milliken, Colorado.

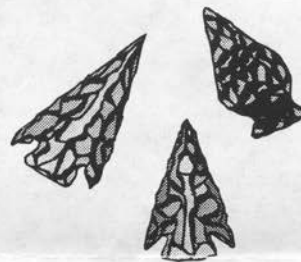

## ICE-AGE HORSE EXCITES SCIENTISTS

WHITEHORSE, Yukon Territory (AP) - Carbon dating on the remains of a horse found last fall near the Alaskan-Canadian border show it died 26,000 years ago, experts said, making it one of the best-preserved Ice Age animals ever discovered in North America.

Miners found the horse near Dawson City, 340 miles north of Whitehorse. Experts believe it may have died in a creekbed and that an overhanging bank collapsed on it, preserving it through the millennia.

Papers from the 1990 Wetherill- Grand Gulch Symposium

Julia Johnson and two other Boulder women, Ann Hayes, and Ann Phillips, became part of a small research team determined to reconstruct history which took place a hundred years ago. Their endeavor involved a canyon in southeastern Utah call Grand Gulch. This 54 mile long canyon empties into the San Juan River and was home to the largest community of Anasazi Basketmaker Indians anywhere in the southwest between 700 and 1300 A.D. They hoped to discover collections which had been removed from the canyon during the late 1800s by about twelve expeditions, most notably several expeditions by the same men who discovered Mesa Verde, the Wetherill brothers from Mancos, Colorado.

After four years they located collections, reconnected them to their original burial site, gathered written information concerning the expeditions and photographed collections in two national museums. In May 1990 they concluded their work with a symposium, the largest of its kind attended by 500 professional and amateur archaeologists. They were presented the highest award given by the Department of the Interior to volunteers contributing to the conservation and management of natural and cultural resources of the United States. The December 1993 issue of "Smithsonian" magazine has an article describing the "Wetherill Project".
