Jean Kindig to Speak on High Altitude Ceramics

Two ceramic sites were excavated near the Continental Divide west of Boulder. Hikers using a trail that transects one of these sites have continuously crushed ceramic sherds beneath their boot, the remnants of a ceramic vessel that was once the valued possession of a prehistoric family. Other artifacts from both sites indicate people hunted butchered and camped temporarily in this high valley for many thousands of years.

The Stapp Cabin Survey

Before reporting on the Stapp cabin survey, I think that an introduction is in order. My name is Cindy Miller. I moved to Boulder from Alabama a little over a year ago in order to attend the University of Colorado's Anthropology degree program. I am happy to say that I am currently enrolled and pursuing that goal now. While living in Huntsville, Alabama, I was an active member of the Alabama Archaeological Society and held the post of Vice-President of our chapter. I am glad to have found such an active group here in Colorado with which to become associated. I hope to meet many of you soon.

Now for the interesting information.... July 27 was the date of the archaeological and historic inventory of the Stapp cabin. The crew included Tom Cree, Karen Good, Jim Morrell, Martha Patterson and myself. Martha and Jim were tasked with surveying the property while Karen collected photographs of existing structures and the surrounding environment. That left drawing up the site plans to Tom and I. We couldn't have asked for a more perfect day. The temperature remained in the mid-seventies all day and except for the usual Colorado cloud gatherings in the afternoon, the sun accompanied us throughout the day.

The Stapp cabin is located approximately two miles northwest of Ward in the Roosevelt National Forest. The two-story cabin is of wood-frame construction with bark siding. The cabin was built on a cement slab with a rock and cement foundation border. The cabin, as well as interior furniture, were built by Joe Stapp, a craftsman and settler in the area. The cabin architecture is an excellent example of area vernacular design. There are two other structures located on the property – a storage garage and an outhouse that is no longer in use.

Aspen groves and wildflower meadows are just some of the natural beauty that surround this cabin. We took advantage of a small gathering of Aspens for our lunch break, prior to working the site. Running along the northern most side of the property, the land drastically slopes down to a free-flowing stream. The water was not particularly high during our visit but you could tell by the surrounding terrain that the water climbs considerably during the year.

As anticipated, no prehistoric cultural material was discovered during the inventory. There was, however, some evidence of mining in the immediate area. A large mine drift was located near the road and another smaller drift was found south of the cabin 100 feet up the hillside. In addition, there was a rock cache found between the cabin and the outhouse that conforms to the vernacular storage of mining explosives and detonation equipment.

It is recommended that the Stapp Cabin and property be submitted for registration as an archaeological site with the State Historic Preservation Office as well as inclusion in the Colorado Registry of Historic Places. It is further recommended that a plan for preservation and continued use of the site be initiated.
