September 2013 Presentation Meeting Exploring Western Basketmaker II Social Identity and InteractionsThrough Material Culture and Headdress Designs

Meeting details 7:00 pm. Dinosaur room, CU Museum Presentation by Dr. Lynda McNeil

In this paper, I explore what *style* in archaeology means, as well as what it can reveal regarding the ethnic identity and social interaction of its makers. Using data from forty-eight rock art sites in the Four Corners region, I employ a presence-absence seriation analysis of headdress designs to test the claim that Basketmaker Anthropomorphic style rock art was an in situ development of the Colorado Plateau Archaic Anthropomorphic Tradition. The results of this seriation study reveal how San Juan Basketmakers (SJBM) used non-local headdress designs, including hybridization, to express between-group social boundaries and in-group identity grounded in a shared worldview. It also shows how the Eastern Basketmaker descendants of Archaic indigenes appear to have used headdress design emulation and admixure to communicate between-group solidarity with SJBM. These findings corroborate evidence from other disciplines (linguistics, genetics, and archaeology) of Western Basketmaker interaction with indigenous peoples.

October 2013 Presentation Meeting

The Archaeology of Amache, Colorado's Japanese American Internment Camp

Meeting details 7:00 pm. Dinosaur room, CU Museum Presentation by Dr Bonnie Clark

Archaeology can be a particularly valuable tool for better understanding shadowed histories, like the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II. Since 2006, the University of Denver (DU) Amache Project has been engaged in archaeological research at the Colorado internment camp of Amache, which was Colorado's tenth largest city during World War II. Not only is archaeology revealing new insights about life in the camp, through this research DU students and staff have become part of the community engaged in remembering and preserving this nationally significant site.

Bonnie Clark is an Associate Professor in the University of Denver's Anthropology Department. A professional archaeologist since 1990, Dr. Clark's work has focused on using the tangible past-- artifacts, architecture, settlement patterns--to tell a more inclusive history of western North America. Dr. Clark's research interests include the relationships between material culture, ethnicity, and gender; cultural landscapes; and the politics of heritage management. She teaches a range of classes for the anthropology department including Historical Archaeology, Cultural Narratives, and Anthropologies of Place. Dr. Clark serves as the Curator for Archaeology of the University of Denver Museum of Anthropology and on the Colorado and National Register of Historic Places review board. In the Fall of 2011, Dr. Clark was awarded the University of Denver's Teacher/Scholar of the Year.

Title of Tour: The Line Shack Draw (5LR110): 7,000+ years of Native American and Euro-American History in the Larimer County Foothills

Tour Guide: Michael Troyer (Colorado State University/Bureau of Land Management) and Meegan Flenniken (Larimer County Department of Natural Resources)

Description of Site and Tour: The Line Shack Draw site (5LR110) is a multicomponent site in northern Larimer County. Initial analysis suggests intermittent aboriginal occupation spanning the last 7000 years, with historic sheepherding and ranching components dating to the early 20th century -- all centered around a spring fed draw nestled in the hogbacks. The site was first recorded by CSU in the early 1970s during the Boxelder Water Control Project, and further investigated during the 2006 and 2007 CSU Class II Survey of the Red Mountain Open Space, and the 2009 and 2011 CSU archaeological field schools. Surface inventories and subsurface testing indicate an extensive site with intact, buried components. CSU student arcaheologists have now recorded three prehistoric hearth features, 1138 flakes, 57 formal tools, four stone circles, a prehistoric trade bead, two historic cabins, and a variety of historic artifacts from the large site. The Line Shack tour will begin at the Red Mountain Ranch Open Space parking lot (approximately 1.5 hours from the conference location - directions provided) at 9 am. Carpooling to the parking lot is encouraged. The site is a 1.75 mile one-way, moderate intensity hike, for a total of around 4 miles of hiking including touring the site. The tour will last approximately 3-4 hours. Bring water, snacks, sunscreen, appropriate footwear, and clothing as the weather dictates. Be sure to bring your own lunch, if you like.

Tour Leader: Michael Troyer is an archaeologist with the Bureau of Land Management, Royal Gorge Field Office, in Cañon City, Colorado, and an anthropology graduate student at Colorado State University. He is presently finalizing his thesis (defense date, September 27, 2013), which is aimed at understanding variation in prehistoric hearth morphology across northern Colorado, and includes three hearths recorded on 5LR110.

Tour Capactity: 30 people maxiumum, not including tour leaders. Carpooling to the field trip location is requested by both the Conference Organizers as well as Larimer County Department of Natural Resources (managers of the property)

Boulder IPCAS PAAC Class: Ceramic Description and Analysis – Sign up now!



This course is an introduction to a major artifact class found in Colorado: ceramics. The course covers the technology of ceramic manufacture, basic description and analysis, and an introduction to some American Indian ceramic wares found in the state. The course is not a study of ceramic typology; types will be described on a limited basis, and non-Indian wares are not discussed. The course is of value to those individuals interested in the Late Prehistoric to Protohistoric period occupations (AD 150-1800) of Colorado

Our next PAAC class, Ceramic Description and Analysis will meet on seven Wednesday evenings (Oct 9, Oct 16, Oct 23, Oct 30, Nov 6, Nov 13, Nov 20). This class will be in Boulder, Colorado at the Fire Station on Lookout Rd. in Gunbarrel from 6-9 PM.

Bob Brunswig and a number of IPCAS members participated in the second year of investigations at the Alonzo Allen Cabin site in Allenspark, Colorado. The cabin was built in 1864 and burned down in 1894. Only the stone fireplace has been visible for many years. The excavation of the site yielded mining tools, burned wood, a civil war era military button, historic nails and glass and a piece of wood showing evidence of charring.

Field Trip Opportunity: Tour of Some Archaeology Sites in Montrose, Colorado Area

When: Sept 21, 22, 2013 (all day Saturday and ½ day Sunday)

Limit on Attendance: 20 (Denver Chapter has priority but all CAS members invited. Must be a CAS member to participate)

There has been interest in the archaeology of the Montrose area for at least the last 80 years or so by local avocational archaeologists and professionals alike. The Chipeta Chapter of CAS, Montrose, was chartered in 1935 and is the longest continuously active CAS chapter. Marie Wormington excavated the Moore and Casabier sites in the 1930's. Dr. Lister and the Chipeta Chapter members excavated the Hauser Site in 1960-61, and Dr. Buckles did his dissertation work on Ute Prehistory in the mid-late 1960's, excavating a number of sites in the Montrose area with the help of Chipeta Chapter members. Several of the archaeologists you know or have heard of in Colorado archaeology have spent some part of their careers in Montrose, e.g., Kevin Black, Gordon Tucker, Linda Scott Cummings, Alan Reed, Jon Horn.

The Montrose area is archaeologically complex. There is evidence of many prehistoric cultures there including but not necessarily limited to pre-Ute (Paleo, Archaic, Formative) Ute, Navaho, Ancient Puebloan, and possibly Fremont. The archaeological evidence in the area includes rock shelters, open camps, quarries (including a hard rock mine), petroglyphs, wickiups, and stone circles. On this tour, the plan is to visit a site (Eagles Nest) that has recently produced some 12000 BP C14 dates (lead by Dr. Glade Hayden, local district BLM archaeologist) and also has rock art, visit the Shavano rock art site (lead by Dr. Carol Patterson) which is now part of the Archaeological Conservancy, visit the hard rock mine quarry (The Flint Cave) and associated reduction sites nearby (lead by Neil Hauser), and possibly fit in a visit to a wickiup and/or a rock shelter.

Vehicle: Four wheel drive or a vehicle that can handle rough roads is advised. Some car pooling will likely be possible, but we don't want to get caught short.

Level of Difficulty: There will be some walking up and down moderate slopes (typical canyon slopes). The hike into the quarry is moderately steep and there are a couple of narrow spots on the trail along a cliff. For those of you who don't like heights be advised. The open camps and reduction areas are easy walking.

Weather: September is usually very comfortable but a jacket, hiking boots, sun screen, lunch, and water are all advised.

Overnight facilities: There are motels in Montrose and Delta and campgrounds in the area.

Social: There will be a social, yet to be determined details, on Saturday night.
