

- "I'LL BE FIERCE FOR US ALL": Last month, President-elect Biden nominated Congresswoman Deb Halaand to serve as Secretary of the Interior. <u>If confirmed, she'll be the first Native</u> <u>American to serve in a cabinet position</u>.
- GETS BETTER WITH AGE: Fine wines and cheeses, but also Roman concrete. <u>A University of Utah geologist studied Roman</u> <u>architectural concrete and found a rare mineral that gives the</u> <u>concrete its resilience.</u>
- **PERMANENT PROTECTION FOR HAYNIE**: The Haynie site, a significant ancestral Pueblo village with two Chaco-period great houses northeast of Cortez, is being <u>placed in a</u> <u>conservation easement with La Plata County</u>.
- THE HILLS ARE PYRAMIDS: Discover Magazine recently posted a refresher on Caral, one of the oldest cities in the Americas at 5,000 B.P., which significantly predates other complex societies in the Americas.
- MAKING IT IN A BIG DATA WORLD: The Journal of Field Archaeology is publishing a special edition in February on "Archaeology in the Age of Big Data". <u>Two authors from the issue</u>

were interviewed to discuss the balance between traditional fieldwork and big data analysis.

• FINDING LOST CROPS: Archaeobotanists in Ohio are searching for remnants of pre-European contact and pre-maize crops to figure out how these foods were prepared and why they were lost. Pass the knotweed, please.
