Greetings from IPCAS! We have good news and sad news. Starting with the good: the 85th Annual Meeting of the Colorado Archaeological Society is complete! Our chapter hosted CAS's virtual conference, complete with workshops, speakers, and a keynote address. Recordings of the programming is available for viewing on IPCAS's YouTube channel. As of today, the Alice Hamilton Scholarship Fund should receive over \$1,500 from funds raised as part of the conference. Additionally, no vote was held on the question of raising dues per membership from the Colorado Archaeological Society. The issue was tabled for a vote at a future special meeting. The CAS Board of Directors voted to eliminate senior memberships starting in 2021. While this change affects IPCAS members within a few short months, the IPCAS Executive Board is considering alternatives to offset the increase in membership cost to those affected members.
